



Meeting Minutes:

1. Call to Order: Judge Roger Miller called the meeting to order at 9:33 a.m.

- 2. Opportunity for Public Comment: No comments were made by the public.
- 3. Staff Update: Meeting Schedule; Other Updates; Air Quality.

Uryan Nelson informed the Policy Board of upcoming KTMPO meetings through November. Mr. Nelson updated the board on TxDOT completion of the FY2024 Unified Transportation Plan (UTP). Mr. Nelson reminded the board that the KTMPO Project Call opened on September 1st and all applications are due Friday, October 27th. Mr. Nelson mentioned a TIP administrative amendment for Salado's Royal Street project to change the let date from FY24 to FY25 due to environmental clearance timeline concerns. Maximum ozone air quality readings for the month of August were 76 parts per billion (ppb) at the Temple station and 77 ppb at the Killeen station.

4. Action Item: Approve minutes from the August 16, 2023, meeting.

Councilmember Riakos Adams made a motion to approve the August 16, 2023 meeting minutes, seconded by Councilmember Susan Long; the motion passed unanimously.

5. Discussion and Action Item: Regarding the Nomination and Election of TPPB Chair and Vice Chair

Judge Roger Miller was nominated to serve a second term as TPPB Chair, no other nominations were made. Councilmember Susan Long was nominated to serve a second term as TPPB Vice Chair, no other nominations were made.

Councilmember Riakos Adams made a motion for Judge Roger Miller and Susan Long to be Chair and Vice Chair for FY2024, seconded by Mayor David Leigh; the motion passed unanimously.

6. Discussion Item: Regarding the KTMPO TAC and Policy Board Meeting Schedule for FY2024.

James McGill presented the FY2024 meeting calendar to the Policy Board. Mr. Nelson noted the two TAC meeting date changes from the usual first Wednesday of the month and the three Policy Board meeting date changes from the usual third Wednesday of the month.

Councilmember Riakos Adams made a motion to approve the KTMPO Meeting Schedule for FY2024, seconded by Darrell Burtner; the motion passed unanimously.

7. Discussion and Action Item: Regarding Resolution 2023-08 supporting October 2023 as Walk to School Month

James McGill provided a history of October being walk to school month. Mr. McGill commented that KTMPO wants to support any events for walk to school day, creating an awareness for pedestrian infrastructure and safety.

Ryan Haverlah made a motion to approve Resolution 2023-08 supporting October 2023 as Walk to School Month, seconded by Mayor David Leigh; the motion passed unanimously.

8. Discussion and Action Item: Regarding initiation of public involvement for an amendment to the Congestion Management Process (CMP)

James McGill provided the Policy Board with the background on the amendment for the Congestion Management Process (CMP). Mr. McGill shared that KTMPO staff have been working with the Texas A&M Transportation Institute (TTI) to gather appropriate data for 10 added capacity projects that have been constructed since 2016 and provide an analysis of those projects' effects on the regional transportation system. Mr. McGill stated that the analysis has been compiled into a draft appendix to be added to the current CMP, and that since the CMP is being amended a 15-day public comment period with a public meeting is required.

Mayor Michael Blomquist made a motion to initiate public involvement for the amendment to the Congestion Management Process, seconded by Councilmember Riakos Adams; the motion passed unanimously.

9. Discussion Item: Regarding revisions to the KTMPO Bylaws.

Uryan Nelson highlighted proposed revisions to the KTMPO Bylaws including one additional Policy Board member from Temple, not including incarcerated persons in population counts in case the MPO boundary is expanded, and the addition of a Small and Rural representative to the Technical Advisory Committee for entities without a current voting member. Mr. Nelson also noted that the current bylaws do not specify who the Chair of the TAC is and then opened the floor for discussion.

Discussion was held about whether a chair should be elected from the TAC body or if staff should continue to act as the chair for the committee. A consensus was reached that the bylaws should have language to state that staff will preside over the TAC meetings as chair for that committee.

Ryan Haverlah mentioned one more proposed change that would require a regular review of the Bylaws at least once every 5 years.

10. Discussion Item: Regarding the Bylaws, Safety, and Project Scoring Working Groups.

James McGill shared that the Safety working group is meeting following the Policy Board meeting today.

11. Discussion Item: Regarding an update on the Safe Streets & Roads For All (SS4A) Grant.

Uryan Nelson shared that KTMPO met with Kimley-Horn to review the scope of work for the project and discuss next steps for the project. Mr. Nelson mentioned that a Safety Task Force associated with this project was going to be set up and that if any Policy Board members were interested in serving on it to contact staff.

12. Discussion Item: Regarding possible MPO Boundary Expansion Update.

Uryan Nelson shared that there are currently no new updates on the possible MPO Boundary Expansion. Mr. Nelson stated that KTMPO would be getting a new TxDOT MPO coordinator in October, so this conversation will be brought to their attention.

13. Discussion Item: Regarding public input received through August 2023.

James McGill shared a comment on the August Policy Board meeting recording regarding the hyperloop discussion that happened.

14. Member Comments:

Darrell Burtner announced HCTD's partnership with Fort Cavazos to provide service between the base and the rest of HCTD's micro transit system.

15. Adjourn: The meeting adjourned at 10:27 a.m.

Congestion Management Process (CMP) Amendment

Background

KTMPO's received one corrective action request during the 2022 Federal Certification Review (FCR) to amend the CMP in order to account for the effect of added capacity projects on the congestion network.

KTMPO staff have been working with the Texas A&M Transportation Institute (TTI) to gather appropriate data for 10 added capacity projects that have been constructed since 2016 and provide an analysis of those projects' effects in response to the FCR finding. The analysis has been compiled into a draft appendix to be added to the current CMP.

Amendments to KTMPO plans are required to undergo a 15-day public comment period with one public hearing during that period.

Schedule:

- September 6, 2023 TAC considers recommending initiation of public involvement for an amendment to the CMP;
- September 20, 2023 TPPB considers initiation of public involvement for an amendment to the CMP;
- September 25, 2023 October 9, 2023: 15-Day Public Comment Period.
- October 4, 2023 TAC considers recommending approval of an amendments to the CMP;
- October 5, 2023 Public Meeting: Harker Heights

Killeen-Temple MPO invited the public to submit comments on their points of view and interests regarding a proposed amendment to the Congestion Management Process (CMP). Public Comments were accepted by email, telephone, U.S. Postal Service mail and in person or virtually during the Public Meetings. The Public Comment Period began September 25, 2023, and ended October 9, 2023.

Notices for the Public Meetings were posted in the Killeen Daily Herald, Temple Daily Telegram and on the KTMPO website on the following dates: September 23, 2023. Notices and invitations were posted to the Facebook page on September 25, 2023, at 12:01 AM and were boosted beginning September 29 – October 9, 2023, with a post reach of 1,620.

The first Public Meeting was held on Thursday, October 5, 2023, from 12 PM – 1 PM at the Central Texas Council of Governments, Belton, Texas. This was an in-person meeting with a live virtual option. The Public Meeting began promptly at 12 PM. KTMPO staff provided copies of the "Congestion Management Process (CMP)" and were available to answer questions and receive comments. Two KTMPO staff and one member of the public attended.

The second Public Meeting was held on Thursday, October 5, 2023, from 5:30 - 6:30 PM at the Harker Heights Public Library, 400 Indian Trail, Harker Heights Texas. The Public Meeting began promptly at 5:30 PM. This was an in-person meeting with a live virtual option. KTMPO staff provided copies of the "Congestion Management Process (CMP)" and were available to answer questions and receive comments. Four KTMPO staff and a member of the public attended the meeting.

A third public comment was received by KTMPO staff during regular business hours.

2. Comment Analysis

The Survey Response Matrix in Table 1 summarizes the public comments on the Congestion Management Process (CMP) amendment. The CMP provides an analysis of recently completed and ongoing roadway widening projects in the KTMPO region. The data indicates there has been a reduction in congestion and travel time delays following the completion of these projects. The public was asked by survey, if they agreed with the data analysis, the specific question was, "Have you noticed a difference in travel time or congestion on these roadways?" In general, the public agreed with the data that congestion and travel time delays have been reduced on these roadway segments.

An overview of where comments were received:

- KTMPO During Business Hours 1

Survey responses in Table 1 indicate that the public agreed with the data analysis that there was an improvement on the projects identified. The N/A indicates that the public did not travel on the segment of roadway and therefore was unaware of any improvement.

KTMPO Bylaws

The KTMPO Bylaws Working Group has recommended several revisions to the KTMPO Bylaws for consideration by the TAC and Policy Board. These include:

- Temple receiving an additional member on the Policy Board due to exceeding the 75,000 population requirement
- Addition of language noting that incarcerated persons will not be used to determine voting membership in the MPO
- Creation of a Small and Rural representative position on the TAC
 - Individuals wishing to serve will be nominated in writing and then selected by the Policy Board for 1-year terms
- Addition of language specifying that the KTMPO Director (or designee) will fill the role of Chairperson for all TAC meetings
- Addition of language requiring a review of the Bylaws at least once every 5 years, within 6 months of the release of relevant census data and/or the expansion of the MPO boundary

Official By-Laws of the Transportation Planning Policy Board (TPPB)

Designated Metropolitan Planning Organization for Central Texas

LATEST REVISION: October 18, 2023

Transportation Planning Policy Board Killeen-Temple Metropolitan Planning Organization

Articles of Organization

WHEREAS, the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1962 required a continuing, comprehensive transportation planning process carried on cooperatively by the State and local communities of each urban area of more than 50,000 population in order to qualify transportation projects for federal aid; and

WHEREAS, in the Killeen-Temple area the transportation study process was established by agreement among the local governments and the State of Texas for the purpose of developing suitable transportation plans, with the prospectus for the Killeen-Temple Urban Transportation Study (FY 1982-1986) establishing the organization and composition of the Transportation Planning Committee; now called the Transportation Planning Policy Board (TPPB): and

WHEREAS, the Metropolitan Planning Organization shall work for the designated area; and

WHEREAS, the main functions of the Transportation Planning Policy Board shall be to provide policy guidance to the transportation planning process; approve the Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP), Transportation Improvement Plan (TIP) and the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP); and promote the implementation of the TIP and UPWP.

Now, THEREFORE, the members of this committee do hereby agree to the purposes stated in these articles of organization and do associate themselves for those purposes.

Name

The name of this committee shall be the Transportation Planning Policy Board for the Killeen-Temple Metropolitan Planning Organization (KTMPO).

ARTICLE I

Purpose

The Transportation Planning Policy Board provides regional transportation policy guidance for those participating government entities and agencies which comprise the Killeen-Temple metropolitan planning area. See Appendix A.

Code of Ethics

The KTMPO shall adopt an Ethics Policy applicable to both KTMPO committees and employees representing the KTMPO. As stated in Texas Transportation Code, Title 7, Section 472.034, each new employee or official representing the KTMPO shall receive a copy of the Ethics Policy no later than the third business day after the date the person begins employment, or the person qualifies for office. KTMPO staff shall keep a record of the Ethics Policy distribution method.

Membership

Transportation Planning Policy Board

The voting membership of the Transportation Planning Policy Board will be representative of the population makeup of the MPO planning area and will consist of one representative for each city with a population between 10,000 and 40,000, two representatives for cities with populations between 40,000 and 75,000 and three representatives for cities with populations over 75,000 based on population counts from the most recent Decennial census; two representatives for Bell County, one to represent the KTMPO metropolitan planning area boundary prior to the June 17, 2009 expansion and one to represent the KTMPO metropolitan planning area boundary post June 17, 2009 expansion; one representative each for the counties of Coryell and Lampasas; one representative for Hill Country Transit District. All cities within the KTMPO metropolitan planning area with a population under 10,000 shall be represented by their county or County Commissioners Court appointee. See Appendix A.

*Incarcerated persons shall not count toward the population numbers used to determine jurisdictional/ voting membership in the MPO.

Based upon the most recent completed Decennial Census results, the composition of the Transportation Planning Policy Board (TPPB) voting membership will be as follows:

Title 23, U.S.C. Section 134(d) (2) outlined the membership goal stating that Transportation Planning Policy Boards shall consist of elected officials. Therefore, member entities shall appoint elected officials to the Transportation Planning Policy Board. In the event an elected official is unseated from their elected status, their term on the Transportation Planning Policy Board will end at the next Annual Meeting. All Transportation Planning Policy Board members are appointed and may be removed by their Governing Body at any time. Additionally, if a Transportation Planning Policy Board member will be unable to attend a meeting, that member may, in writing, appoint a voting proxy to vote in his stead and be counted for quorum purposes.

Each of the following agencies or offices shall be represented by one (1) non-voting member and they shall be referred to as ex-officio members.

- a) Fort Cavazos Military Installation
- b) State Senators, State Representatives, and US Representatives serving the KTMPO area
- c) Federal Highway Administration
- d) Federal Transit Administration
- e) Texas Air Control Board
- f) Federal Aviation Administration
- g) Airport Managers-Killeen and Temple
- h) Central Texas Council of Governments
- i) Others, as may be appropriate

Cities within the planning area with a population of under 10,000 (presently Nolanville, Troy, Little River/Academy, Kempner, Village of Salado, Bartlett, Holland, Rogers, and Morgan's Point Resort) shall be represented by their County Transportation Planning Policy Board member. However, they will be encouraged to attend all meetings and to participate in deliberations.

Individuals serving on this Policy Board shall be designated in writing by the following:

County Members	County Commissioners Court
TxDOT Districts	Waco and Brownwood District Engineers
City Members	Mayor, City Council or Manager as designated by the Governing Body
Transit MemberFort Cavazos	Hill Country Transit District Board of Directors III Corps Commander or his/her designee

Technical Advisory Committee

There shall be a Technical Advisory Committee formed, whose purpose will be to review technical issues and develop preferred technical alternatives for Policy Board action. The membership of this committee is as follows:

The following entities shall have one voting seat on the Technical Advisory Committee: Killeen, Temple, Copperas Cove, Belton, Harker Heights, Bell County, Coryell County, Lampasas County, Hill Country Transit District, TxDOT-Waco District, TxDOT-Brownwood District, and a Small and Rural Representative from one of the jurisdictions with a population of under 10,000.

The Small and Rural Representative shall be nominated in writing by their local jurisdiction, and formally approved by the Transportation Planning Policy Board at each annual meeting. Should the Policy Board receive more than one nomination for this representative, the Policy Board shall make the final determination as to which individual will serve in this capacity.

The following entities shall have one non-voting seat on the Technical Advisory Committee: Nolanville, Troy, Little River/Academy, Morgan's Point Resort, Village of Salado, Kempner, Bartlett, Holland, Rogers, Fort Cavazos, Federal Highways Administration, Federal Transit Administration, and KTMPO Staff. TxDOT may appoint up to two non-voting members.

Individuals serving on this Technical Advisory Committee shall be designated in writing by the following:

Alternates will be allowed to vote in the place of the member they are representing provided they are designated in writing prior to the start of any Technical Committee Meeting.

The Chairperson of the Technical Advisory Committee will be the MPO Director or his/her designee who shall preside over all meetings of the Technical Advisory Committee.

Other Sub-committees may be established by the Transportation Planning Policy Board chairman as deemed necessary, including specifying the membership and duration of each. Transportation Planning Policy Board members and Technical Advisory Committee members may be designated for sub-committee membership.

Meetings

A. Frequency

Meetings will be called on a schedule to be determined by a majority vote of the members as necessary, with at least four public meetings per year. The Annual Meeting will normally be held no later than September 30th of each year.

B. Method of Calling Meetings

- 1. The chairperson may call meetings.
- 2. Any five (5) members may request that a meeting be called by written request to the Chairperson.

C. Meeting Notices

The MPO Director or his/her designee will be responsible for all meeting notices and publicity. Specifics of the meeting will be provided to each Transportation Planning Policy Board member in writing and to the general public in accordance with the provisions of the Texas Open Meeting Law. The Transportation Planning Policy Board members will be notified of all meetings at least three (3) days prior to the meeting, other than emergency meetings which will be called in accordance with the open meeting act.

D. Meeting Facilities

It will be the responsibility of the KTMPO Director or his/her designee to make arrangements for the meeting place.

E. Date and Time of Meetings

If the date is different than the dates established in the currently approved Public Participation Plan, it will be the responsibility of the KTMPO Director or his/her designee to poll the membership to select a date and time for the meeting that would be convenient for the majority of the members.

F. Minutes

The KTMPO Director or his/her designee shall keep a record of the proceedings of the board. These minutes will be recorded on tape and summarized in writing.

Vote of the Membership

Each member shall have one (1) vote. A simple majority vote of the quorum will be sufficient to authorize action. The vote will be open (show of hands or voice). The KTMPO Director or his/her designee will serve to validate membership credentials.

Quorum

Fifty percent plus one of the voting members or their alternates, with a minimum of representatives from four (4) voting membership entities or agencies, will constitute a quorum.

Special Circumstances

A. In times of a declared disaster or emergency impacting the KTMPO region, the KTMPO Director and CTCOG Director will take action on KTMPO matters which will be ratified by the KTMPO Policy Board following the lifting of the disaster or emergency declaration.

B. In times of a declared disaster or emergency impacting the KTMPO, special called meetings may be held and action taken via conference call with a quorum of fifty percent plus one of the voting members or their alternates, with a minimum of four (4) membership entities or agencies.

ARTICLE II

Officers

A. Chairperson

The Chairperson shall be chosen by a simple majority vote of the membership present at the election with a quorum established. The Chairperson shall perform the duties usually assigned to the office, such as; preside over all meetings of this committee; be an ex-officio member of any subcommittee formed within this body; and vote as a regular member of the board.

B. Vice Chairperson

The Vice Chairperson shall be chosen by a simple majority vote of the membership present at the election with a quorum established. In the absence of, or in case of the inability of the Chairperson to act, it shall be the duty of the Vice Chairperson to perform all the duties of the Chairperson.

Term of Office

Both the Chairperson and the Vice Chairperson shall serve one (1) year terms and may not succeed themselves in those offices more than once. The term of office shall run from October 1st of the year of the election through September 30th of the following year.

Time of Election

The officer election will be held at the Annual Meeting every year.

Special Elections

In the event that the Chairperson is unable to serve, the Vice Chairperson shall assume the office of Chairperson and call a special election at the next regular, special, or Annual Meeting to fill the office of Vice Chairperson for the remaining portion of the term. Should the Vice Chairperson be unable to serve, the Chairperson shall call a special election at the next regular, special or Annual Meeting to fill the office of Vice Chairperson for the remaining portion of the remaining portion of the term. If both the Chairperson and Vice Chairperson are unable to serve, the MPO Director or his/her designee shall call a special election at the next regular, special or Annual Meeting to fill these vacancies for the remaining portion of the term.

ARTICLE III

Amendments

These bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds affirmative vote of the membership present and voting at any regular, special or Annual Meeting of the members, provided that official notice of the proposed amendment is included in the agenda packets in advance of the scheduled meeting and a quorum is established.

Required Review

These bylaws shall be reviewed every 5 years, within 6 months of the release of relevant census data, and membership evaluated to ensure it is representative of the MPO Planning Region. Between Decennial Census count, data retrieved from the American Community Survey will be used.

These bylaws shall be reviewed following any expansion of the MPO boundary to ensure adequate representation.



KTMPO 2020 Adjusted Urbanized Area Recommendations

Background

Following the release of Census Urban Areas after each decennial census, TxDOT's Transportation Planning & Programming Division (TPP) reviews the provided boundaries and then conducts a smoothing exercise for planning and mapping purposes. The adjusted urbanized areas based on the raw Census Urban Areas take into account neighboring pockets that do not meet Census thresholds for urban areas and are clearly defined by physical boundaries (roads, rivers, etc).


The adjusted Urban Boundaries can lead to MPO Boundary changes if cities have grown outward over the previous decade. TxDOT has provided their Adjusted Urbanized Area boundaries to all MPOs in the state for review and consent. For KTMPO, there are two locations where TxDOT's recommended boundary is outside of KTMPO's current boundary. One location is inside of Fort Cavazos and the other covers a small undeveloped section of land just south of SH 9 in Copperas Cove.

A map is included in your packet showing the current boundary, previous adjusted urban areas, and proposed adjusted urban areas.

MPOs may either adopt the urbanized area boundary adjustments as-is or recommend changes to TxDOT. KTMPO must make a decision this month as TxDOT is planning to submit the adjusted boundaries to FHWA for approval November 1st.

TAC recommended approval at their meeting on October 4, 2023.

<u>Action Needed:</u> Consider taking action on the TxDOT recommended 2020 Adjusted Urbanized Area boundaries.

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Item 8: MTP Update



2050 MTP Steering Committee

The Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) is KTMPO's 25-year long-range transportation plan for the region. The MTP lists the goals and objectives for future transportation as well as strategies for implementing those goals and objectives. KTMPO is required to update the MTP every 5 years to ensure that the vision for our future transportation system remains relevant and effective.

The 2050 MTP update is due in May 2024. Staff have begun reviewing the document for any data and material revisions that are needed. During this process, we are also interested in reviewing the goals and objectives listed in the MTP to see if any updates are needed. Staff is planning to host several public meetings in the spring to get public feedback on the current goals and objectives as well as where improvements to the current transportation system can be made.

Staff also discussed the possible creation of a Steering Committee comprised of TAC and Policy Board members to review the current goals and objectives and provide feedback prior to the public meetings. Staff envisions the Steering Committee meeting a few times in November and December for this work.

<u>Action Needed:</u> Consider the creation of a Steering Committee for the 2050 MTP Update.


