

Meeting Minutes:

- 1. Call to Order: Councilmember Susan Long called the meeting to order at 9:33 a.m.
- 2. Opportunity for Public Comment: No comments were made by the public.
- 3. Staff Update: Meeting Schedule; Other Updates; Air Quality.

Uryan Nelson informed the Policy Board of upcoming KTMPO meetings through December. Mr. Nelson reminded the board that the KTMPO Project Call applications are due Friday, October 27th. Mr. Nelson informed the Policy Board of two TIP administrative amendment, one for project C45-02 (SH 9 Turnaround) to decrease funding by 117,600 to match the approved UTP amount and one for Project W35-07 (Loop 363 – Lucius McCelvey & Industrial) to change the let date change from 2026 to 2024 due to TxDOT funding acceleration. Maximum ozone air quality readings for the month of August were 79 parts per billion (ppb) at the Temple station and 80 ppb at the Killeen station.

4. Action Item: Approve minutes from the September 20, 2023, meeting.

Ryan Haverlah made a motion to approve the September 20, 2023, meeting minutes, seconded by Kristina Rameriz; the motion passed unanimously.

5. Discussion and Action Item: Regarding approval of an amendment to the Congestion Management Process (CMP).

James McGill provided the Policy Board an update on the public comment period for the CMP. Mr. McGill shared that three public comments in the form of survey responses were received and they were all neutral or positive. Mr. McGill stated that FHWA has reviewed the draft appendix and informed staff that it will satisfy the corrective action once approved.

Raymond Suarez made a motion to approve the amendment to the Congestion Management Process, seconded by Ryan Haverlah; the motion passed unanimously.

6. Discussion Item: Regarding the approval of proposed revisions to the KTMPO Bylaws.

Uryan Nelson presented the proposed revisions to the KTMPO Bylaws including:

- addition of one Policy Board member from Temple.
- not including incarcerated persons in population counts in case the MPO boundary is expanded.
- the addition of a Small and Rural representative to the Technical Advisory Committee for entities without a current voting member.
- addition of language specifying the KTMPO Director will fill the role of Chairperson of all TAC Meetings.
- addition of language requiring a review of the Bylaws at least once every 5 years, within 6 months of the release of relevant census data.

Commissioner Bobby Whitson asked to clarify the term limits on the Small and Rural representative, if one year was an adequate amount of time. Mr. Nelson stated that each member on TAC is reappointed by their representing entity each year, so it only seems fair for the term limit to be one year.

Commissioner Bobby Whitson made a motion to approve the proposed revisions to the KTMPO Bylaws, seconded by Councilmember Riakos Adams; the motion passed unanimously.

7. Discussion and Action Item: Regarding adoption of the KTMPO 2020 Adjusted Urbanized Areas recommended from TxDOT.

James McGill provided a history of why TxDOT updates the official urbanized areas after each census data, to make the planning boundaries contain all designated urban areas and are aligned with natural physical boundaries. Mr. McGill presented the two small areas suggested for changes in the KTMPO boundaries. Mr. McGill explained that if we do decide to accept these changes then the MPO is required to update

our boundaries to include these new areas. Mr. McGill stated that staff do not see any significant impact of adding these boundaries.

Councilmember Riakos Adams made a motion to approve the proposed KTMPO 2020 Adjusted Urbanized Areas recommended from TxDOT, seconded by Mayor David Leigh; the motion passed unanimously.

8. Discussion and Action Item: Regarding the 2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) Update and the creation of a steering committee.

James McGill provided information on the current status of the MTP update and how staff are planning to move forward. Mr. McGill mentioned that staff is wanting to receive input on the front end of this process on the goals and objectives of the MTP. Mr. McGill mentioned the idea of creating a steering committee to meet a couple of times to help make some recommendations on updates. Uryan Nelson suggested that this committee could be comprised of 3 TAC and 3 Policy Board members.

The floor opened for discussion was opened on the creation of a steering committee and what the intended outcome of the committee would be. Mayor David Leigh suggested that the committee have a clear objective and goals if created. Bob van Til asked for clarification on whether the committee would be reviewing all the projects submitted during the project call.

Mayor David Leigh made a motion to create a steering committee of 3 members from TAC and 3 from Policy Board to review the MTP goals and objectives, seconded by Councilmember Riakos Adams; the motion passed unanimously.

9. Discussion Item: Regarding a presentation from Hill Country Transit District about new micro-transit services and partnership with Fort Cavazos.

Darrell Burtner and Raymond Suarez from Hill County Transit District presented on their new micro transit system and partnership with Fort Cavazos.

10. Discussion Item: Regarding the Bylaws, Safety, and Project Scoring Working Groups.

James McGill shared that the Safety working group is meeting following the Policy Board meeting on November 15, 2023. Mr. McGill shared that the plan is to have a draft proposal for targets finalized in December and a resolution adopting those targets included on the January agenda.

11. Discussion Item: Regarding an update on the Safe Streets & Roads For All (SS4A) Grant.

Uryan Nelson shared that staff have been working with Kimley-Horn to finalize the Plan's High Injury Network. Mr. Nelson noted that staff have sent emails to county leadership about setting up meetings and have identified potential safety champions from major stakeholders. Mr. Nelson mentioned that on November 6, 2023 there will be a safety transportation summit. Mr. Nelson also mentioned that KTMPO will be meeting with the consultant and FHWA on how to track in-kind dollars.

12. Discussion Item: Regarding possible MPO Boundary Expansion Update.

Uryan Nelson shared that there are currently no new updates on the possible MPO Boundary Expansion. Mr. Nelson stated that KTMPO has a new TxDOT MPO coordinator, so this conversation has been brought to his attention.

13. Discussion Item: Regarding public input received through September 2023.

Resolution 2023-09 Supporting Functional Classification Change

Background

Functional classification (FC) is a system used by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) to group roads according to what kind of service they provide. Roadways generally serve one of two primary travel functions, access or mobility. Interstates and arterials fall into the mobility category since these facilities allow for greater through movement with less access, while local roads fall into the access category because they allow for greater access and less through movement.

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is charged with ensuring that the FC of roadways within the state is kept up to date. TxDOT Districts and MPOs can request updates to the FC system when needed. These changes are usually triggered when:

- New roadways are built
- Existing roadways are realigned or reconstructed
- Traffic patterns or volumes change
- Land use patterns change

Discussion

The current construction of the Rogers Relief Route in southeast Bell County and the impending planned expansion of the Copperas Cove Bypass in Coryell County will require changes to those facilities functional classification.

- Copperas Cove Bypass upgrade to other freeways and expressways (FC 2)
- Rogers Relief Route upgrade to principal arterial/other (FC 3)

FHWA prefers that FC change requests are made prior to construction or at least the completion of construction. Since both of these facilities are within the MPO planning area, TxDOT must also receive concurrence from KTMPO for these changes.

TAC recommended approval at their meeting on November 1, 2023.

Background

2023 KTMPO Project Call Objective Scoring RFP Contract

Background

On October 13, 2023 staff released a Request for Proposals (RFP) to assist with the objective scoring of projects submitted during the 2023 KTMPO Project Call. Only one response was received from High Street Consulting.

High Street's original response came in at a much higher cost than anticipated. Staff have negotiated with High Street on a refined scope of work to reduce costs and received a revised proposal last week that would cost \$45,000. This amount is within KTMPO's FY24 budget for this project.

Policy Board approval of a contract with the selected proposer is needed to comply with KTMPO's current procurement policy.



Plan and Project Overview

While all roads are analyzed, plan focus will be on locally owned roads

Process includes conceptual development of:

Up to 6 projects for SS4A Implementation Grant funding applications
Up to 10 projects for HSIP or similar safety program funding applications



KTMPO FY24 Safety Performance (PM1) Target Setting

Background

The Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act requires the Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) and the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) to demonstrate a performance-based decision process that ties back to regional performance targets. 23 United States Code (U.S.C) Section 150 and the FAST Act require State DOTs and MPOs to establish performance standards and meet subsequent reporting requirements for the following national performance measures.

- Safety (PM1)
- Pavement and Bridge Condition (PM2)
- System Performance & Freight Travel Time Reliability (PM3)
- CMAQ (Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality) Improvement Program
- Transit Asset Management (State of Good Repair)
- Transit Agency Safety Plan (PTASP)

Safety Performance Rule

The Safety Performance Rule (PM1), found in 23 CFR 490.207(a1-5), establishes safety performance measures to address fatalities and serious injuries on roadways and is evaluated using Crash Records Information System (CRIS) and Vehicular Miles Traveled (VMT) estimates. This Rule is to better invest transportation funding for safety improvement projects to support safe roadway networks.

TxDOT sets safety performance targets for five federally required safety performance measures. These targets include:

- number of fatalities,
- fatalities per million miles traveled,
- number of serious injuries,
- serious injuries per million vehicle miles traveled, and
- number of non-motorized fatalities and non-motorized serious injuries.

In January 2018, January 2019, February 2020, March 2021, February 2022, and January 2023 the KTMPO Policy Board approved support of the State's safety performance targets.

FY 2024 Safety Performance PM-1 targets are required to be adopted by February 2024. Staff have been reviewing and analyzing local crash data to set regional safety targets. The Safety Working Group has been assisting this effort.

The latest draft ideas for setting targets are included in the meeting packet for review and discussion.




