

Meeting Minutes:

- 1. Call to Order: Connie Quinto called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m.
- 2. Opportunity for Public Comment: No comments were made by the public.
- 3. Staff Update: Meeting Schedule; Other Updates; Air Quality.

James McGill informed the TAC of upcoming KTMPO meetings through October. Mr. McGill updated the group on KTMPO's Federal Certification Review, and the FY23-26 TIP status. Mr. McGill reminded the TAC that Officer elections for Policy Board would be conducted at the Policy Board meeting on September 21st, 2022. Mr. McGill informed the TAC of the stakeholder meeting conducted for the Bell County Thoroughfare plan and that Policy Board approved a work group for SS4A Grant Match consisting of Ryan Haverlah (Copperas Cove), Mayor Tim Davis (Temple), Commissioner Bobby Whitson (Bell County), Councilmember Michael Boyd (Killeen). Maximum ozone air quality readings for the month of June were 65 parts per billion (ppb) at the Temple station and 66 ppb at the Killeen station.

4. Action Item: Approve minutes from the July 6, 2022, meeting.

Jason Deckman made a motion to approve the July 6, 2022, meeting minutes, seconded by Darrell Burtner; the motion passed unanimously.

5. Discussion and Action Item: Regarding Resolution 2022-08 supporting the 2024 and 2026 Travel Time Reliability (PM3) performance targets for KTMPO established by the Texas Department of Transportation.

James McGill gave a brief overview of the Travel Time Reliability Performance Measure (PM3) and presented the recommended targets given to the MPO by TTI.

Judge Roger Miller asked how the KTMPO current time travel reliability numbers compared to the new target range. Bob van Til asked how these goals relate to safety and how we can use this data to address system issues in the region. Jason Deckman suggested that KTMPO staff reach out to TTI for further understanding and so they can come educate the Committee on the development of these targets. Various members discussed our targets for the region.

Jason Deckman made a motion to recommend approval of Resolution 2022-08 supporting KTMPOs System Performance (PM3) targets for 2024 and 2026 along with guidance for staff to engage TIT for further education, seconded by Judge Roger Miller; the motion passed unanimously.

6. Discussion and Action Item: Regarding updated language in the MPO-TxDOT Self Certification Statement.

James McGill presented updates to the MPO-TxDOT Self Certification form in the TIP recommended by TxDOT following the passage of the IIJA.

Kristina Ramirez made a motion to recommend approval of updates to the MPO-TxDOT Self Certification form in KTMPO's TIP, seconded by Bobby Lewis; the motion passed unanimously.

- **7. Discussion and Action Item:** Regarding Amendment #2 to the FY22-23 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) to:
 - a) Update the Planning Emphasis Areas (PEAs) language;
 - b) Add Performance Measure language; and
 - c) Move funds from Task 5, Special Studies to Task 1, Administration; Task 2, Data Development; Task 3, Short Range Planning; and Task 4, Metropolitan Transportation System.

James McGill presented recommendations for the proposed amendment to the FY22-23 UPWP and explained why the staff was proposing them.

Judge Roger Miller confirmed that the funds currently in Task 5 are just a placeholder for special studies, and not obligated toward specific projects.

Jason Deckman made a motion to recommend approval of Amendment #2 to the FY22-23 UPWP, seconded by Kristina Ramirez; the motion passed unanimously.

8. Discussion Item: Kimley Horn presentation on the TIP Viewer Dashboard Tool.

Caroline Leonard and Kaitlyn Ng with Kimley Horn gave a brief presentation over the TIP Viewer Dashboard tool to the TAC.

9. Discussion Item: Regarding 2022 TxDOT HSIP Program presentation

Lauren Wolf presented on the Texas Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) to the TAC.

Resolution 2022-10 Providing Guidance on Addressing KTMPO Project Inflation Requests

Recent inflation issues have had significant impacts on the cost of materials for construction projects. In August, the City of Nolanville requested additional funding from the MPO due to these impacts and staff expects more requests as the country continues to experience the effects of inflation. KTMPO staff is putting forward this resolution to provide guidance and direction for future increased funding requests from local entities.

Included in the meeting packet is a resolution that will be presented to KTMPO Transportation Planning Policy Board at their September meeting to provide guidance on increased funding requests.

RESOLUTION NO. 2022-10

A RESOLUTION OF THE KILLEEN-TEMPLE METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION PROVIDING GUIDANCE ON ADDRESSING KTMPO PROJECT INFLATION REQUESTS.

WHEREAS; recent inflation issues have significantly impacted the cost of materials for construction projects; and local entities may submit requests for increased construction funding to KTMPO; and WHEREAS; the Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) allows administrative WHEREAS; modifications to project construction costs if the change in estimated federal cost share is less than \$1.5 million or less than 50% of the original amount; and WHEREAS; increased funding requests beyond the STIP administrative revision requirements will be subject to the formal amendment process and review by the Policy Board. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Killeen-Temple Metropolitan Planning Organization Transportation Planning Policy Board supports requests to increase construction funding for projects that meet the STIP administrative modification requirements, subject to available KTMPO funding FURTHERMORE, BE IT RESOLVED those requests exceeding the amounts and limits aforementioned, shall be approved by the Killeen-Temple Metropolitan Planning Organization Transportation Planning Policy Board at an open meeting with a quorum present.
