

Meeting Minutes:

1. Call to Order: Judge Roger Miller called the meeting to order at 9:41 a.m.

2. Opportunity for Public Comment: No comments were made by the public.

3. Staff Update: Meeting Schedule; Other Updates; Air Quality.

Uryan Nelson informed the Policy Board of upcoming KTMPO meetings through October. Mr. Nelson updated the Policy Board on TxDOT annual traffic counts for the Waco District happening August 7th through the 24th. Mr. Nelson informed the board of the AMPO professional guidance on ChatGPT coming out. Mr. Nelson shared that TxDOT has provided a new smoothed urbanized area boundary to staff based on the 2020 Census that has two small areas in Coryell County outside of the current official MPO boundary. Mr. Nelson reminded the Policy Board of Officer elections happening next month. Maximum ozone air quality readings for the month of June were 63 parts per billion (ppb) at the Temple station and 60 ppb at the Killeen station.

4. Action Item: Approve minutes from the July 19, 2023, meeting.

Riakos Adams made a motion to approve the July 19, 2023, meeting minutes, seconded by Ryan Haverlah the motion passed unanimously.

5. Discussion Item: Regarding the Fort Worth to Laredo High Speed Rail Study presentation.

Dan Lamers and Brendon Wheeler from NCTCOG and Zack Lamothe from TransPod presented their vision for the high-speed rail form Fort Worth to Laredo, and how KTMPO can be a part of that vision.

The floor opened for discussion following the presentation, several key points were discussed. Uryan Nelson proposed a potential test track between Temple and Killeen, which NCTCOG confirmed as feasible. Victor Goebel asked about local government and TxDOT roles in utility relocation, ROW, and environmental studies, TransPod clarified that no financial contribution is sought. The project aims for private funding, requiring TxDOT's intercity jurisdictional support currently. Jason Deckman inquired about power source, with a response indicating a mix of own generation and grid use.

6. Discussion and Action Item: Regarding revisions to the KTMPO Call for Projects Application Form & Scoring Guidelines.

James McGill presented the updated KTMPO Project Scoring Guidelines and updated Call for Projects Application Form. Mr. McGill highlighted the changes to the scoring guidelines. These changes include combining similar subjective criteria together and removing other criteria completely. Mr. McGill noted that the main reason for reducing the number of criteria is to reduce the burden on TAC during project scoring. Mr. McGill also stated that less subjective criteria would make objective criteria more valuable and noted that no project came close to receiving all subjective points during the last project call. Mr. McGill noted two other changes that roadway projects would be split into two rankings (Major Roadway & Minor Roadway) after scoring and that projects where additional match above the required 20% are eligible for 1 bonus point via a vote from TAC.

Ryan Haverlah asked about the removal of category local support criteria. James McGill mentioned that projects can still gain points in other subjective criterion based on the information in letters of support and that staff believes the submitting entity should determine how important projects are instead of scoring entities.

Ryan Haverlah made a motion to approve the KTMPO Call for Projects Applications Form and Scoring Guidelines, seconded by Mayor Michael Blomquist; the motion passed unanimously.

7. Discussion and Action Item: Regarding the 2023 KTMPO Call for Projects dates.

James McGill shared that staff is proposing to open the KTMPO Call for Projects on September 1, 2023, with a submission deadline of October 27, 2023. Mr. McGill made mention that originally the closing date was October 13, but after discussion with TAC that recommendation was moved to October 27th, to allow more time for submission.

Riakos Adams made a motion to approve the 2023 KTMPO Call for Projects dates, seconded by Councilmember Susan Long; the motion passed unanimously.

8. Discussion Item: Regarding updates on the Bylaws, Safety, and Project Scoring Workgroups.

Uryan Nelson stated that the Bylaws working group would be meeting following the Policy Board meeting to finalize their draft recommendations, which will be brought back next month for consideration. James McGill shared that the Safety Workgroup meet for the first time on August 8, 2023 and planning to meet again in September where staff will present some methodology ideas.

9. Discussion Item: Regarding an update on the Safe Streets & Roads For All (SS4A) Grant.

Uryan Nelson shared that KTMPO's grant agreement with FHWA has been fully executed grant and that 3 RFP proposals were received. Mr. Nelson noted that the CTCOG and KTMPO officers met and selected a consultant. The consultant is working on the scope of work for the project now and we should have a signed contract with them soon. Mr. Nelson also informed the Policy Board that if any discussion related to SS4A needs to be documented and submitted to the KTMPO to be used as in-kind match requirement.

10. Discussion Item: Regarding an update on the possible MPO Boundary Expansion.

Uryan Nelson shared that there is currently no update on the possible MPO Boundary Expansion.

11. Discussion Item: Regarding public input received through July 2023.

James McGill shared that staff received an email from a citizen via TxDOT requesting a loop and more sidewalks/bike lanes in the region.

12. Member Comments:

Judge Roger Miller thanked everyone for working so diligently on the working groups and making a big impact.

13. Adjourn: The meeting adjourned at 11:02 a.m.

Resolution 2023-08 Supporting October 2023 as Walk to School Month

Organized by the Partnership for a Walkable America, Walk to School Day in the US began in 1997 as a one-day event in support of a movement for year-round safe routes to school. The event became international in 2000 when Canada, the UK, and the USA joined together for the first International Walk to School Day. Since then, growing interest from around the globe has expanded the promotion of walking to the whole month of October each year. More information can be found <u>here</u>.

International Walk to School Day helps promote visibility for walking or bicycling to school and creates safer routes for students to walk and bike to school. This year, Walk to School Day will occur on Wednesday, October 4th.

Congestion Management Process (CMP) Amendment

Background

KTMPO's received one corrective action request during the 2022 Federal Certification Review (FCR) to amend the CMP in order to account for the effect of added capacity projects on the congestion network.

KTMPO staff have been working with the Texas A&M Transportation Institute (TTI) to gather appropriate data for 10 added capacity projects that have been constructed since 2016 and provide an analysis of those projects' effects in response to the FCR finding. The analysis has been compiled into a draft appendix to be added to the current CMP.

Amendments to KTMPO plans are required to undergo a 15-day public comment period with one public hearing during that period.

Designated Metropolitan Planning Organization for Central Texas

LATEST REVISION: March 18, 2020

Transportation Planning Policy Board Killeen-Temple Metropolitan Planning Organization

Articles of Organization

WHEREAS, the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1962 required a continuing, comprehensive transportation planning process carried on cooperatively by the State and local communities of each urban area of more than 50,000 population in order to qualify transportation projects for federal aid; and

WHEREAS, in the Killeen-Temple area the transportation study process was established by agreement among the local governments and the State of Texas for the purpose of developing suitable transportation plans, with the prospectus for the Killeen-Temple Urban Transportation Study (FY 1982-1986) establishing the organization and composition of the Transportation Planning Committee; now called the Transportation Planning Policy Board (TPPB): and

WHEREAS, the Metropolitan Planning Organization shall work for the designated area; and

WHEREAS, the main functions of the Transportation Planning Policy Board shall be to provide policy guidance to the transportation planning process; approve the Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP), Transportation Improvement Plan (TIP) and the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP); and promote the implementation of the TIP and UPWP.

Now, THEREFORE, the members of this committee do hereby agree to the purposes stated in these articles of organization and do associate themselves for those purposes.

Name

The name of this committee shall be the Transportation Planning Policy Board for the Killeen-Temple Metropolitan Planning Organization (KTMPO).

ARTICLE I

Purpose

The Transportation Planning Policy Board provides regional transportation policy guidance for those participating government entities and agencies which comprise the Killeen-Temple metropolitan planning area. See Appendix A.

Code of Ethics

The KTMPO shall adopt an Ethics Policy applicable to both KTMPO committees and employees representing the KTMPO. As stated in Texas Transportation Code, Title 7, Section 472.034, each new employee or official representing the KTMPO shall receive a copy of the Ethics Policy no later than the third business day after the date the person begins employment, or the person qualifies for office. KTMPO staff shall keep a record of the Ethics Policy distribution method.

Membership

Transportation Planning Policy Board

The voting membership of the Transportation Planning Policy Board will be representative of the population makeup of the MPO planning area and will consist of one representative for each city with a population between 10,000 and 40,000, two representatives for cities with populations between 40,000 and 75,000 and three representatives for cities with populations over 75,000 based on population counts from the most recent Decennial census; two representatives for Bell County, one to represent the KTMPO metropolitan planning area boundary prior to the June 17, 2009 expansion and one to represent the KTMPO metropolitan planning area boundary post June 17, 2009 expansion; one representative each for the counties of Coryell and Lampasas; one representative for Hill Country Transit District. All cities within the KTMPO metropolitan planning area with a population under 10,000 shall be represented by their county or County Commissioners Court appointee. See Appendix A.

*Incarcerated persons shall not count toward the population numbers used to determine jurisdictional/ voting membership in the MPO.

Based upon the most recent completed Decennial Census results, the composition of the Transportation Planning Policy Board (TPPB) voting membership will be as follows:

Title 23, U.S.C. Section 134(d) (2) outlined the membership goal stating that Transportation Planning Policy Boards shall consist of elected officials. Therefore, member entities shall appoint elected officials to the Transportation Planning Policy Board. In the event an elected official is unseated from their elected status, their term on the Transportation Planning Policy Board will end at the next Annual Meeting. All Transportation Planning Policy Board members are appointed and may be removed by their Governing Body at any time. Additionally, if a Transportation Planning Policy Board member will be unable to attend a meeting, that member may, in writing, appoint a voting proxy to vote in his stead and be counted for quorum purposes.

Each of the following agencies or offices shall be represented by one (1) non-voting member and they shall be referred to as ex-officio members.

- a) Fort Cavazos Military Installation
- b) State Senators, State Representatives, and US Representatives serving the KTMPO area
- c) Federal Highway Administration
- d) Federal Transit Administration
- e) Texas Air Control Board
- f) Federal Aviation Administration
- g) Airport Managers-Killeen and Temple
- h) Central Texas Council of Governments
- i) Others, as may be appropriate

Cities within the planning area with a population of under 10,000 (presently Nolanville, Troy, Little River/Academy, Kempner, Village of Salado, Bartlett, Holland, Rogers, and Morgan's Point Resort) shall be represented by their County Transportation Planning Policy Board member. However, they will be encouraged to attend all meetings and to participate in deliberations.

Individuals serving on this Policy Board shall be designated in writing by the following:

Technical Advisory Committee

There shall be a Technical Advisory Committee formed, whose purpose will be to review technical issues and develop preferred technical alternatives for Policy Board action. The membership of this committee is as follows:

The following entities shall have one voting seat on the Technical Advisory Committee: Killeen, Temple, Copperas Cove, Belton, Harker Heights, Bell County, Coryell County, Lampasas County, Hill Country Transit District, TxDOT-Waco District, TxDOT-Brownwood District, and a Small and Rural Representative from one of the jurisdictions with a population of under 10,000.

The Small and Rural Representative shall be nominated in writing by their local jurisdiction, and formally approved by the Transportation Policy Board at each annual meeting. Should the Policy Board receive more than one nomination for this representative, the Policy Board shall make the final determination as to which individual will serve in this capacity.

The following entities shall have one non-voting seat on the Technical Advisory Committee: Nolanville, Troy, Little River/Academy, Morgan's Point Resort, Village of Salado, Kempner, Bartlett, Holland, Rogers, Fort Cavazos, Federal Highways Administration, Federal Transit Administration, and KTMPO Staff. TxDOT may appoint up to two non-voting members.

Individuals serving on this Technical Advisory Committee shall be designated in writing by the following:

Alternates will be allowed to vote in the place of the member they are representing provided they are designated in writing prior to the start of any Technical Committee Meeting.

Other Sub-committees may be established by the Transportation Planning Policy Board chairman as deemed necessary, including specifying the membership and duration of each. Transportation Planning Policy Board members and Technical Advisory Committee members may be designated for sub-committee membership.

Meetings

A. Frequency

Meetings will be called on a schedule to be determined by a majority vote of the members as necessary, with at least four public meetings per year. The Annual Meeting will normally be held no later than September 30th of each year.

B. Method of Calling Meetings

- 1. The chairperson may call meetings.
- 2. Any five (5) members may request that a meeting be called by written request to the Chairperson.

C. Meeting Notices

The MPO Director or his/her designee will be responsible for all meeting notices and publicity. Specifics of the meeting will be provided to each Transportation Planning Policy Board member in writing and to the general public in accordance with the provisions of the Texas Open Meeting Law. The Transportation Planning Policy Board members will be notified of all meetings at least three (3) days prior to the meeting, other than emergency meetings which will be called in accordance with the open meeting act.

D. Meeting Facilities

It will be the responsibility of the KTMPO Director or his/her designee to make arrangements for the meeting place.

E. Date and Time of Meetings

If the date is different than the dates established in the currently approved Public Participation Plan, it will be the responsibility of the KTMPO Director or his/her designee to poll the membership to select a date and time for the meeting that would be convenient for the majority of the members.

F. Minutes

The KTMPO Director or his/her designee shall keep a record of the proceedings of the board. These minutes will be recorded on tape and summarized in writing.

Vote of the Membership

Each member shall have one (1) vote. A simple majority vote of the quorum will be sufficient to authorize action. The vote will be open (show of hands or voice). The KTMPO Director or his/her designee will serve to validate membership credentials.

Quorum

Fifty percent plus one of the voting members or their alternates, with a minimum of representatives from four (4) voting membership entities or agencies, will constitute a quorum.

Special Circumstances

A. In times of a declared disaster or emergency impacting the KTMPO region, the KTMPO Director and CTCOG Director will take action on KTMPO matters which will be ratified by the KTMPO Policy Board following the lifting of the disaster or emergency declaration.

B. In times of a declared disaster or emergency impacting the KTMPO, special called meetings may be held and action taken via conference call with a quorum of fifty percent plus one of the voting members or their alternates, with a minimum of four (4) membership entities or agencies.

ARTICLE II

Officers

A. Chairperson

The Chairperson shall be chosen by a simple majority vote of the membership present at the election with a quorum established. The Chairperson shall perform the duties usually assigned to the office, such as; preside over all meetings of this committee; be an ex-officio member of any subcommittee formed within this body; and vote as a regular member of the board.

B. Vice Chairperson

The Vice Chairperson shall be chosen by a simple majority vote of the membership present at the election with a quorum established. In the absence of, or in case of the inability of the Chairperson to act, it shall be the duty of the Vice Chairperson to perform all the duties of the Chairperson.

Term of Office

Both the Chairperson and the Vice Chairperson shall serve one (1) year terms and may not succeed themselves in those offices more than once. The term of office shall run from October 1st of the year of the election through September 30th of the following year.

Time of Election

The officer election will be held at the Annual Meeting every year.

Special Elections

In the event that the Chairperson is unable to serve, the Vice Chairperson shall assume the office of Chairperson and call a special election at the next regular, special, or Annual Meeting to fill the office of Vice Chairperson for the remaining portion of the term. Should the Vice Chairperson be unable to serve, the Chairperson shall call a special election at the next regular, special or Annual Meeting to fill the office of Vice Chairperson for the remaining portion of the remaining portion of the term. If both the Chairperson and Vice Chairperson are unable to serve, the MPO Director or his/her designee shall call a special election at the next regular, special or Annual Meeting to fill the office of the term.

ARTICLE III

Amendments

These bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds affirmative vote of the membership present and voting at any regular, special or Annual Meeting of the members, provided that official notice of the proposed amendment is included in the agenda packets in advance of the scheduled meeting and a quorum is established.

Required Review

These bylaws shall be reviewed every 5 years, within 6 months of the release of relevant census data, and membership evaluated to ensure it is representative of the MPO Planning Region. Between Decennial Census count, data retrieved form the American Community Survey will be used.

These bylaws shall be reviewed following any expansion of the MPO boundary to ensure adequate representation.



Grant Opportunities

• Reconnecting Communities and Neighborhoods Grant Program (RCN) Deadline: September 28, 2023

<u>Description</u>: The Department of Transportation is combining two major discretionary grant programs, the Reconnecting Communities Pilot (RCP) and Neighborhood Access and Equity (NAE) programs, into one Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO). Together, this combined program is known as the Reconnecting Communities and Neighborhoods (RCN) Program. The primary goal of the NAE Program is to assist economically disadvantaged or undeserved communities for planning and construction activities. Funds for the fiscal year (FY) 2023 NAE grant program are to be awarded on a competitive basis to support planning, capital construction, and regional partnership activities that aim to restore community connectivity through the removal, retrofit, mitigation or replacement of highways, roadways, or other infrastructure facilities that create barriers to mobility, access or economic development.

The RCN NOFO solicits grant applications for the Reconnecting Communities Pilot discretionary grant program, established by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL), and for the newly created Neighborhood Access and Equity discretionary grant program, established by the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA).

Under the combined RCN Program, USDOT offers three grant types:

Capital Construction Community Planning Regional Partnerships Challenge

• Community Planning Grants

<u>Description</u>: These grants support planning activities for future construction projects and innovative community planning to address local transportation challenges. Eligible activities include public engagement, feasibility studies, and other planning efforts. Up to \$50 million of RCP funds and \$135 million of NAE funds are available for community planning grants in FY 2023.

• Capital Construction Grants

<u>Description</u>: These grants fund projects aimed at removing, retrofitting, mitigating, or replacing existing transportation facilities that create barriers to community connectivity. The projects should focus on improving access, reducing environmental harm, and enhancing transportation infrastructure. Up to \$148 million of RCP funds and \$2.57 billion of NAE funds are available for eligible construction activities in FY 2023.

• Regional Partnerships Challenge Grants

<u>Description:</u> These grants support regional collaboration and innovation in addressing persistent regional challenges related to equitable access and mobility. Projects must involve two or more eligible applicants and demonstrate regional coordination, leveraging of resources, and policy alignment. Up to \$450 million of NAE funds are available for regional partnership grants in FY 2023.




