

#### **Commitment to Strengthening Communities**

AMPO is dedicated to advancing the interests of Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) and their communities. AMPO supports the development of sustainable transportation systems that promote economic growth, social equity, and environmental stewardship.

#### **Legislative Priorities for MPOs**



#### Shifting Discretionary Funding to Formula Funding

We support a shift from discretionary funding toward formula-based allocations. Formula funding ensures a more equitable and predictable distribution of resources, which will enable our member organizations to plan and implement long-term transportation projects effectively. However, we understand the value discretionary programs can provide and will continue to advocate for the programs that garner the support of MPOs.



#### **Reducing Local Match for Federal Transportation Programs**

We urge the reduction of local match requirements for federal transportation projects. By lowering these burdensome match requirements, MPOs will have greater flexibility to address critical infrastructure needs and enhance transportation services for our communities.



#### Metropolitan Planning Organizations Becoming Direct Recipients for Federal Funds

AMPO supports greater flexibility in granting direct recipient status to MPOs for federal funds. This will streamline the funding process, eliminate unnecessary bureaucratic hurdles, and empower our member organizations to make decisions that directly benefit their respective communities.



#### Allowing for Carryover of Federal Funds

We advocate for a provision that permits the carryover of federal funds from one fiscal year to the next. This will facilitate the completion of long-term projects, ensuring that our efforts to improve transportation infrastructure are not hindered by year-to-year funding constraints.

#### **Meeting Minutes:**

- **1. Call to Order:** James McGill called the meeting to order at 9:35a.m.
- 2. Opportunity for Public Comment: No comments were made by the public.
- 3. Staff Update: Meeting Schedule; Other Updates; Air Quality.

James McGill reminded the TAC of upcoming KTMPO meetings through April and shared the topics for the upcoming TEMPO March meeting, including updates on a new MPO, greenhouse gas measures, and an

update on the Manuel on Uniform Traffic Control Devices. The maximum ozone air quality readings for the month of February were 48 parts per billion (ppb) at the Temple station and 51 ppb at the Killeen station.

**4. Action Item:** Approve minutes from the February 14, 2024, meeting.

Jason Deckman made a motion to approve the February 14, 2024, meeting minutes, seconded by Darrell Burtner; the motion passed unanimously.

**5. Discussion and Action Item:** Regarding recommending approval of Resolution 2024-04 recognizing April 2024 as National Distracted Driving Awareness Month.

James McGill presented Resolution 2024-04, recognizing April 2024 as National Distracted Driving Awareness Month. Mr. McGill highlighted the statistics surrounding distracted driving in Texas, as well as statistics specific to the KTMPO region.

Mayra Cantu made a motion to recommend the approval of Resolution 2024-04 recognizing April 2024 as National Distracted Driving Awareness Month, seconded by Bobby Lewis; the motion passed unanimously.

**6. Discussion and Action Item:** Regarding recommending approval of amendments to the FY23-26 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and 2045 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP).

James McGill presented the TAC with the FY23-26 TIP and 2045 MTP amendments, informing the TAC that one comment has been received to-date for the public comment period for the amendments. Mr. McGill reminded the TAC that the public comment period would end on March 11, 2024, and emphasized that the proposed TIP and 2045 MTP amendments have no fiscal impact on the KTMPO budget.

Jason Deckman made a motion to recommend the approval of amendments to the FY23-26 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and 2045 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP), seconded by Darrell Burtner; the motion passed unanimously.

**7. Discussion and Action Item:** Regarding recommending initiation of public involvement for the FY2025-2028 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP).

James McGill provided background on the 2025-2028 TIP and initiated public involvement for the FY2025-2028 TIP. Mr. McGill shared the 30-day public comment period schedule and announced two upcoming public meetings on April 3, 2024, and April 18, 2024, with the locations and times yet to be determined.

Bobby Lewis made a motion to recommend the approval of initiation of public involvement for the FY2025-2028 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), seconded by Bryan Neaves; the motion passed unanimously.

**8. Discussion Item:** Regarding draft project scores from the 2023 KTMPO Project Call.

James McGill provided an update on the 2023 KTMPO Project Call, sharing all the scores KTMPO has received. Mr. McGill updated the TAC on the last criterion needed for completion and outlined a potential timeline for its fulfillment. Mr. McGill reminded the TAC that scores are not yet finalized, allowing members to submit their scores if they have not yet done so. The floor was then opened for discussion.

9. Discussion Item: Regarding an update on the KTMPO MTP Steering Committee.

James McGill provided an update on the last MTP Steering Committee meeting and informed the TAC the next meeting will follow the March TPPB meeting.

10. Discussion Item: Regarding an update on the Safe Streets & Roads For All (SS4A) Grant.

James McGill provided an update on the SS4A Grant and informed the TAC the next Safety Task Force meeting will be held next week. Judge Roger Miller also informed the TAC that individual cities can also apply for federal funds through the SS4A Grant.

11. Discussion Item: Regarding an update on the possible MPO Boundary Expansion.

James McGill provided an update regarding the MPO Boundary Expansion, informing the TAC that Coryell and Lampasas Counties have already obtained funding for projects that have not let. Mr. McGill noted that if the MPO Boundary were to expand, these projects would lose their funding. Mr. McGill explained that KTMPO will not consider expanding its boundary until after these projects have let.

**12. Discussion Item:** Regarding the April 8, 2024, Solar Eclipse event.

Judge Roger Miller addressed the TAC, providing an update on the local preparation for the expected increase in tourism due to the Solar Eclipse. Darrel Burtner explained that HCTD will be canceling transit services on April 8, 2024, except for a few buses allocated for emergency service use if needed.

13. Discussion Item: Regarding public input received through February 2024.

James McGill shared the public comment received through February, noting that the area of jurisdiction mostly applied to issues outside of KTMPO's jurisdiction. Mr. McGill informed the TAC that staff responded to the commenter and directed them to the MPO within the appropriate jurisdiction.

#### 14. Member Comments:

Darrell Burtner updated the TAC on HCTD's pilot launch at Fort Cavazos, introducing their micro-transit services. Mr. Burtner expressed optimism about the region's transition to micro-transit services following the success of the pilot launch.

#### 2050 Fiscal Constraints

#### **Background**

As a requirement, the 2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) must be fiscally constrained to both short-range and long-range planning targets.

#### **Short-Range Financial Planning**

For short-range financial projections for the years 2024-2034, staff referred to TXDOT's Unified Transportation Program (UTP). The UTP is a 10-year financial plan organized into 12 funding categories, with each one addressing a specific type of work that addresses the State's transportation needs.

#### Long-Range Financial Planning

For long-range financial projections for the years 2035-2050, staff referred to Texas Transportation Institute's (TTI) Transportation Revenue Estimator and Needs Determination or TRENDS (<a href="http://trends-tti.tamu.edu">http://trends-tti.tamu.edu</a>). The TRENDS Model is designed to provide transportation planners, policy makers, and the public with a tool to forecast revenues and expenses. Each option is hypothetical, scenarios may not reflect actual policy-based decisions during select years, and future funding is estimated and may not reflect actual funding received.

A user can control a number of scenarios related to assumptions regarding statewide transportation needs, population growth rates, fuel efficiency, inflation rates, taxes, fees, and other elements. By running different scenarios, the model provides the user with estimated future transportation funds.

TRENDS is updated on a monthly basis to include the latest cash forecasts and letting schedules from TxDOT. In addition, as updates regarding population forecasts, inflation rates, fuel efficiency, and other variables become available they will be incorporated into the model.

#### **TRENDS Model Inputs**

- Basic input: Population Growth Rate. Updates based on migration (Texas Demographic Center).
  - Low: half as previous decade
  - Med: no option
  - High: same as previous decade (Default)
- Basic input: Fuel Efficiency. TVMT by vehicle type (personal/commercial) for fuel tax revenues (FHWA/Cambridge Systematics).
  - o Low: Low MPG
  - Low-Med Average
  - Med: Med MPG (Default)
  - High: High MPG
- Basic input: New Capacity. Investment of additional state funds in increased transportation capacity. Additional billions of state dollars to be invested are entered along with year improvements begin/end.
  - 2030 Committee Report of Texas transportation infrastructure needs (Default) <a href="https://texas2030committee.tamu.edu/documents/final\_022609\_execsummary.p">https://texas2030committee.tamu.edu/documents/final\_022609\_execsummary.p</a> df
- Advanced input: Other Transportation Variables. Maintenance variables, expense variables, inflation rates, gasoline and diesel taxes, fees, local revenue options, bond finance, economic impact, and other elements.

#### **Funding Category Details:**

Category 2 Metropolitan Area (TMA) Corridor Projects: Category 2 addresses mobility and added capacity projects on urban corridors within Metropolitan Planning Organization areas with a population greater than 50,000 but less than 200,000, to mitigate traffic congestion, as well as traffic safety, and roadway maintenance or rehabilitation. Projects must be located on the state highway system. The Texas Transportation Commission allocates funds to each metropolitan planning organization (MPO) in the state, by formula. MPOs select and score projects for this category. Common project types include roadway widening (both freeway and non-freeway), interchange improvements, and roadway operational improvements.

**Category 4 Statewide Connectivity Corridor Projects:** Category 4 addresses mobility on major state highway system corridors, which provide connectivity between urban areas and other statewide corridors. Projects must be located on the designated highway connectivity network that includes:

- Texas Highway Trunk System
- National Highway System (NHS)
- Connections to major seaports or border crossings
- National Freight Network
- Hurricane evacuation routes

The designated connectivity network was selected by the Texas Transportation Commission and includes three corridor types:

- Mobility corridors: High-traffic routes with potential need for additional roadway capacity
- Connectivity corridors: Two-lane roadways requiring upgrade to four-lane divided
- Strategic corridors: Routes that provide unique statewide connectivity, such as Ports-to-Plains

Category 7 Metropolitan Mobility and Rehabilitation: Category 7 addresses transportation needs within the boundaries of MPOs with populations of 200,000 or greater — known as transportation management areas (TMAs). This funding can be used on any roadway with a functional classification greater than a local road or rural minor collector. Common project types include roadway widening (both freeway and non-freeway), new-location roadways, and interchange improvements.

Category 9 Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside Program: Category 9 handles the federal Transportation Alternatives (TA) Set-Aside Program. These funds may be awarded for the following activities: Construction of sidewalks, bicycle infrastructure, pedestrian and bicycle signals, traffic-calming techniques, lighting and other safety-related infrastructure, and transportation projects to achieve compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. Construction of infrastructure-related projects that provide safe routes for non-drivers.

Category 10 Supplemental Transportation Programs: Carbon Reduction Program addresses improvements designed to reduce transportation emissions, defined as carbon dioxide (CO2) emissions from on-road highway sources. Carbon Reduction funding is allocated to urbanized areas with populations over 200,000 (TMAs), areas with populations 50,000 to 200,000, and small areas with populations under 50,000. Some eligible projects include traffic management, congestion reduction technology, truck parking, energy efficient streetlights, traffic controls and options to reduce congestion using alternatives to single occupant vehicle trips, including public transportation, pedestrian and bicycle facilities, and shared/pooled vehicle trips.

**Category 11 District Discretionary:** Category 11 addresses TxDOT district transportation maintenance, safety, or mobility needs.

**<u>Action Needed:</u>** Recommend approval of short and long-range fiscal constraints.

#### **Background**

The Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) is the 25-year document that outlines the state of current transportation, projects future needs, and offers projects and other methods for keeping the people and freight in the KTMPO region moving efficiently. The MTP encompasses all aspects of transportation planning as well as transportation projects within the KTMPO region. Each local entity submits projects within their jurisdiction for possible inclusion into the MTP, and the Transportation Planning Policy Board (TPPB) prioritizes these projects based on the needs of the region. This plan is required to be updated every five years.

This is a new standing item to provide monthly updates on the 2050 MTP development process.

#### **Prioritization Process Pilot Program (PPPP)**

The IIJA established the Prioritization Process Pilot Program (PPPP) to provide discretionary grant funds that can be used to develop and implement a publicly accessible, transparent, data-driven prioritization process for the selection of projects in Statewide and Metropolitan Transportation Plans (i.e., S/LRTP, MTP, RTP) and Transportation Improvement Programs (STIP/TIP). The purpose of the PPPP is to support data-driven approaches to planning that, upon completion, can be evaluated for public benefit. The program provides funding to develop and implement a publicly accessible, transparent prioritization process for the ranking and selection of projects for inclusion in short-range and long-range transportation plans for state or metropolitan areas, Statewide Transportation Improvement Programs (STIPs), and Transportation Improvement Programs (TIPs) in metropolitan areas. FHWA will award no more than \$10 million in total (\$2 million maximum per award), subject to availability, in each fiscal year for eligible prioritization process pilots that meet the eligibility requirements.

Award Ceiling: \$2 million

#### Consolidated Rail Infrastructure and Safety Improvements (CRISI) Program

This program invests in railroad infrastructure projects that improve safety, support economic vitality (including through small businesses), create good-paying jobs with the free and fair choice to join a union, increase capacity and supply chain resilience, apply innovative technology, and explicitly address climate change, gender equity and racial equity.
