Meeting Minutes:

1. Call to Order: The meeting was called to order at 9:39am.

- 2. Opportunity for Public Comment: No comments were made by the public.
- 3. Staff Update: Meeting Schedule; Other Updates; Air Quality.

Uryan Nelson provided the schedule for the upcoming KTMPO meetings, as well as an upcoming workshop for the 2023 Project Call Funding Scenarios. Mr. Nelson reminded the TPPB that April is National Distracted Driving Awareness month. Mr. Nelson also informed the TPPB of the Texas Transportation Commission Updates, specifically regarding the IH-35 updates and the 2060 Statewide Populations Projections. The maximum ozone air quality readings for the month of March were 52 parts per billion (ppb) at the Temple station and 60 ppb at the Killeen station.

4. Action Item: Approve minutes from the March 20, 2024, meeting.

Mayor Tim Davis made a motion to approve the March 20, 2024, meeting minutes, seconded by Mayor David Leigh; the motion passed unanimously.

5. Discussion and Action Item: Regarding approval of Resolution 2024-05 recognizing May 2024 as National Bike Month.

Uryan Nelson provided an update on the annual resolution recognizing May as National Bike Month. Mr. Nelson provided the TPPB with the National Bike Month Schedule.

Darrell Burtner made a motion to approve Resolution 2024-05 recognizing May 2024 as National Bike Month, seconded by Councilmember Susan Long; the motion passed unanimously.

6. Discussion and Action Item: Regarding approval of the SS4A Project Application Selection List.

James McGill updated the TPPB on the SS4A Project Application Selection List. Dan Malsom gave a presentation on the SS4A Project Application Initial Selection list and the process behind its creation. The floor was then opened for discussion.

Councilmember Susan Long made a motion to approve the SS4A Project Application Selection List, seconded by Kristina Ramirez; the motion passed unanimously.

7. Discussion Item: Regarding 2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) Fiscal Constraints.

James McGill provided the TPPB with an update regarding the 2050 MTP Fiscal Constraints and presented the short- and long-range fiscal constraint models. Mr. McGill explained that the TAC recommended tabling the recommendation for approval of the 2050 MTP Fiscal Constraints until the TAC's next meeting in May. Mr. McGill explained this item is for discussion and will be presented again to the TPPB as an action item at their May meeting.

8. Discussion Item: Regarding an update on the KTMPO 2050 MTP development.

James McGill provided an update on the 2050 MTP development. Mr. McGill informed the TPPB that staff are working on updating Chapter 2, and HCTD is collaborating with staff to update Chapter 5 of the 2050 MTP. Additionally, Mr. McGill provided a timeline for when the 2050 MTP draft will be presented to the TPPB for review.

9. Discussion Item: Regarding an update on the Safe Streets & Roads for All (SS4A) Grant.

James McGill provided an update on the SS4A Grant. Mr. McGill informed the TPPB about the upcoming public engagement events in the next two months and provided an update on the in-kind tracking for the grant. Mr. McGill informed the TPPB about the ongoing social media campaign. Following that, Dan Malsom presented the statistics for the current social media campaign.

10. Discussion Item: Regarding public input received through March 2024.

There were no public comments received.

12. Adjourn: The meeting adjourned at 10:19am.

11. Member Comments:

Stan Swiatek provided an update on the upcoming public involvement opportunities for TxDOT's IH-35 widening project in Belton. FY25-28 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Background

The Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) is a 4-year transportation planning document that includes a detailed listing of projects reasonably expected to be let within a four-year period. A new TIP is developed every 2 years with the current TIP (covering FY23 to FY26) first approved in May 2022.

Projects included in the TIP must be consistent with the Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) and are chosen based on regional priority and available funding. KTMPO staff have completed a draft FY25-28 TIP in coordination with the TxDOT Waco District and using the draft 2025 UTP funding forecasts.

The final FY25-28 TIP must be submitted to TxDOT by July 1, 2024. The Public Comment period was held between March 25 – April 23, 2024. Two public meetings were held and KTMPO received three comments. A summary of the Public Comment Period is included in the meeting packet. The schedule for the KTMPO TIP is provided below.

Public Comment Summary Log

Introduction

In accordance with federal legislation and regulations, and as part of the transportation planning process, the public was invited to review and comment on the proposed KTMPO FY 2025-2028 Transportation Improvement Plan (TIP). KTMPO made this document available for public review for a 30-day comment period from March 25 through April 30, 2024.

Background

The TIP is a 4-year transportation planning document that includes a detailed listing of projects reasonably expected to begin construction within a four-year period. A new TIP is developed every 2 years with the current TIP (covering FY23 to FY26) first approved in May 2022. The new FY25-28 TIP must be submitted to TxDOT by June 18, 2024.

Projects included in the TIP must be consistent with the Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) and are chosen based on regional priority and available funding. The MTP is the 25-year long range planning document for KTMPO that includes a listing of significant regional projects that are fiscally constrained by expected revenues over the planning horizon. Projects must be included in the funded section of the MTP to receive state or federal funding.

Earlier this year KTMPO staff began developing a draft FY25-28 TIP in coordination with TxDOT staff. A timeline for the FY25-28 TIP development is provided below:

- February 14, 2024 TAC review draft FY25-28 TIP;
- February 21, 2024 TPPB review draft FY25-28 TIP;
- March 6, 2024 TAC considers recommending initiation of public involvement for FY25-28 TIP;
- March 20, 2024 TPPB considers initiation of public involvement for FY25-28 TIP;
- March 25, 2024 April 23, 2024 30-day public comment period;
 - o April 3, 2024 Public Meeting #1: Copperas Cove Public Library
 - o April 18, 2024 Public Meeting #2: Central Texas Council of Governments
- May 1, 2024 TAC considers recommending approval of the FY25-28 TIP;
- May 15, 2024 TPPB considers approving the FY25-28 TIP;
- June 18, 2024 KTMPO submit FY25-28 TIP to eSTIP (tentative deadline).

Our Objectives

The objectives of this Public Comment Period are to:

• Inform the public that KTMPO has developed a draft FY25-28 TIP that lists regional projects which are expected to be constructed within the next 4 years.

- Create meaningful opportunities for participation by providing pertinent information, actively listening, and seeking to understand;
- Provide an opportunity for the public to provide feedback; and
- Collecting and sharing the public's comments and concerns with the KTMPO decision-making bodies.

Tools and Techniques

KTMPO staff informed the public using these one-way channels of communication:

- The KTMPO website;
- The County Courthouses;
- The Texas Register; and
- Ran advertisements in two of the largest general circulation newspapers in our region.

KTMPO staff also used these two-way channels of communication:

- Facebook;
- In-person Public Meeting;
- Community Event; and
- In-person with a Live Virtual Option Public Meeting;

On March 21, 2024, three calendar events were published on the KTMPO website (www.ktmpo.org), one for the public comment period beginning on March 25, 2024, and

ending on April 23, 2024, and one each for the public meetings on April 3, 2024, and April 18, 2024. Also, on March 21, 2024, notices were posted at the Bell, Coryell, and Lampasas County Courthouses, on the Texas Register website, and the Central Texas Council of Governments lobby. On Saturday, March 23, 2024, advertisements were run in the Killeen Daily Herald, and the Temple Daily Telegram, as shown in **Figures 1, 2a, 2b, 3a, and 3b**. On March 25, 2024, at 12:00 AM, April 3, 2024, and April 18, 2024, Facebook videos were published, and two Facebook Events were created for the public meetings on April 3, 2024, and April 18, 2024. All online notices provided information regarding the Live Virtual Option information.

A copy of the FY25-28 TIP was linked to the website, the Facebook post and event calendar.

The first Public Meeting was held in Copperas Cove, Texas, on Wednesday, April 3, 2024, from 4:15 – 6:00 PM at the Copperas Cove Public Library. One KTMPO staff was present at this meeting and seven members of the public expressed an interest in learning about the proposed projects in the area. The respondents were citizens of Copperas Cove who frequent the library and an executive staff member with the City of Copperas Cove. KTMPO staff shared information regarding the US 190 Bypass Project that is expected to begin construction in 2026. All the respondents were in favor of the project and mentioned being thankful that the Local Contribution was zero dollars.

At the 2024 Kempner Family Wellness Fair community event, KTMPO hosted a table at the Kempner Family Community Development Center off 2808 in Kempner on Saturday, April 13, 2024, from 9:30 – 12:00 PM. One KTMPO staff was present at the Community Event. KTMPO staff spoke with five members of the community who attended the event. The respondents asked questions about KTMPO's work and were interested in the US 190 Bypass Project.

A second Public Meeting with a Live Virtual Option was held in Belton, on Thursday, April 18, 2024, from 12:00 – 1:00 PM at the Central Texas Council of Governments. Two KTMPO staff were present at the In-Person Meeting with the Live Virtual Option and two members of the public expressed an interest in learning about projects in their neighborhood. One respondent was a CTCOG staff member, and the other was a staff member of a partnering agency housed in the CTCOG building. KTMPO staff reviewed projects in Belton and in Harker Heights. The respondent who lives in Harker Heights mentioned looking forward to the upgrades on Warriors Path, as they were long overdue.

KTMPO staff provided a binder with the copy of the FY25-28 Transportation Improvement Plan (TIP), the KTMPO Public Comment Form, in English and in Spanish, a map at both Public Meetings and the Outreach Event, and Safe Streets and Roads for All business card.

Comment Summary

The Key Performance Indicators are based on three organic video posts.

The first post was published on March 25, 2024, reached 22 with zero engagement. Of the individuals who clicked on the 17-second video, 4 viewed it for at least 3-seconds. The Facebook Key Performance Indicator (KPI) is summarized in **Table 1**.

The second post (video) was published on April 3, 2024, reached 25, with two shares, two audience engagements, zero reactions and zero comments. Of the individuals who clicked on the 17-second video, 5 viewed it for at least 3-seconds. The Facebook KPI are summarized in **Table 2**.

The third post (video) was published on April 18, 2024, reached 316 with one share, two audience engagements, zero reactions and zero comments. Of the individuals who clicked on the 17-second video, 74 viewed it for at least 3-seconds. The Facebook KPI is summarized in **Table 3.**






In the current configuration, this creates a safety hazard of red light runners and lack of visibility to pedestrians and other travelers. -Area wide mandate of all cross walk intersections to comply to a countdown plus X seconds before light change. Using Harker Heights as an example, the pedestrian cross walk will count down when it hits zero, the light goes to a fast yellow and red. A 2-3 second delay here would allow for pedestrians to clear the roadway and not be a countdown for motorists to floor it to get to and through the intersection. Thanks for allowing us to give feedback. While I realize that this feedback is very specific to a set area of the county, I do hope that it is considered.

2050 MTP Fiscal Constraints

Background

As a requirement, the 2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) must be fiscally constrained to both short-range and long-range planning targets.

Short-Range Financial Planning

For short-range financial projections for the years 2024-2034, staff referred to TXDOT's 2025 Unified Transportation Program (UTP). The 2025 UTP is a 10-year financial plan organized into 12 funding categories, with each one addressing a specific type of work that addresses the State's transportation needs.

Long-Range Financial Planning

For long-range financial projections for the years 2035-2050, staff referred to Texas Transportation Institute's (TTI) Transportation Revenue Estimator and Needs Determination or TRENDS (http://trends-tti.tamu.edu). The TRENDS Model is designed to provide transportation planners, policy makers, and the public with a tool to forecast revenues and expenses. Each option is hypothetical, scenarios may not reflect actual policy-based decisions during select years, and future funding is estimated and may not reflect actual funding received.

A user can control a number of scenarios related to assumptions regarding statewide transportation needs, population growth rates, fuel efficiency, inflation rates, taxes, fees, and other elements. By running different scenarios, the model provides the user with estimated future transportation funds.

TRENDS is updated on a monthly basis to include the latest cash forecasts and letting schedules from TxDOT. In addition, as updates regarding population forecasts, inflation rates, fuel efficiency, and other variables become available they will be incorporated into the model.

TRENDS Model Inputs

- Basic input: Population Growth Rate. Updates based on migration (Texas Demographic Center).
 - Low: half as previous decade
 - Med: no option
 - High: same as previous decade (Default)
- **Basic input: Fuel Efficiency**. TVMT by vehicle type (personal/commercial) for fuel tax revenues (FHWA/Cambridge Systematics).
 - Low: Low MPGLow-Med Average
 - Med: Med MPG (Default)
 - High: High MPG
- Basic input: New Capacity. Investment of additional state funds in increased transportation capacity. Additional billions of state dollars to be invested are entered along with year improvements begin/end.
 - 2030 Committee Report of Texas transportation infrastructure needs (Default) https://texas2030committee.tamu.edu/documents/final 022609 execsummary.pdf
- Advanced input: Other Transportation Variables. Maintenance variables, expense variables, inflation rates, gasoline and diesel taxes, fees, local revenue options, bond finance, economic impact, and other elements.

Funding Category Details

Category 2 Metropolitan Area (TMA) Corridor Projects: Category 2 addresses mobility and added capacity projects on urban corridors within Metropolitan Planning Organization areas with a population greater than 50,000 but less than 200,000, to mitigate traffic congestion, as well as traffic safety, and roadway maintenance or rehabilitation. Projects must be located on the state highway system. The Texas Transportation Commission allocates funds to each metropolitan planning organization (MPO) in the state, by formula. MPOs select and score projects for this category. Common project types include roadway widening (both freeway and non-freeway), interchange improvements, and roadway operational improvements.

Category 4 Statewide Connectivity Corridor Projects: Category 4 addresses mobility on major state highway system corridors, which provide connectivity between urban areas and other statewide corridors. Projects must be located on the designated highway connectivity network that includes:

- Texas Highway Trunk System
- National Highway System (NHS)
- Connections to major seaports or border crossings
- National Freight Network
- Hurricane evacuation routes

Category 7 Metropolitan Mobility and Rehabilitation: Category 7 addresses transportation needs within the boundaries of MPOs with populations of 200,000 or greater — known as transportation management areas (TMAs). This funding can be used on any roadway with a functional classification greater than a local road or rural minor collector. Common project types include roadway widening (both freeway and non-freeway), new-location roadways, and interchange improvements.

Category 9 Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside Program: Category 9 handles the federal Transportation Alternatives (TA) Set-Aside Program. These funds may be awarded for the following activities: Construction of sidewalks, bicycle infrastructure, pedestrian and bicycle signals, traffic-calming techniques, lighting and other safety-related infrastructure, and transportation projects to achieve compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. Construction of infrastructure-related projects that provide safe routes for non-drivers.

Category 10 Carbon Reduction Program: Carbon Reduction Program addresses improvements designed to reduce transportation emissions, defined as carbon dioxide (CO2) emissions from onroad highway sources. Carbon Reduction funding is allocated to urbanized areas with populations over 200,000 (TMAs), areas with populations 50,000 to 200,000, and small areas with populations under 50,000. Some eligible projects include traffic management, congestion reduction technology, truck parking, energy efficient streetlights, traffic controls and options to reduce congestion using alternatives to single occupant vehicle trips, including public transportation, pedestrian and bicycle facilities, and shared/pooled vehicle trips.

Category 11 District Discretionary: Category 11 addresses TxDOT district transportation maintenance, safety, or mobility needs.

Staff Recommendation

While the TRENDS Model is updated frequently and produces a high quality estimate in future transportation revenues there are still many uncertainties in projecting long range transportation funding. Because of that staff makes the following recommendations for short-range and long-range fiscal constraints:

- 1. Utilize the 2025 UTP Category projections for short-range fiscal constraint.
- 2. Select the default scenario from the TRENDS Model for long range-fiscal constraint.

On May 1, 2024, TAC recommended approval of TxDOT's 2025 UTP Short-range Financial Planning and the TRENDS Default Scenario.

Background

KTMPO held a Call for Projects in September-October 2023 as part of the 2050 MTP development process. 107 projects (73 roadway and 34 livability) were received during the call. These projects have since been scored according to the objective and subjective criteria spelled out in the KTMPO Project Scoring Guidelines. These project scores will be utilized by staff to develop potential funding scenarios for the FY25-28 TIP and 2050 MTP.

Project Ranking

It is important to note that project ranking merely represents the calculated outcome (i.e. scores) of the developed scoring process with the addition of bonus points, if applicable. The desire is also that project ranking remains as true to the developed process as possible. Project ranking does not guarantee priority or funding order.

Staff also understands that there are additional factors outside of a project score which can impact how important one project is compared to another and acknowledges that project scoring and ranking is just one tool to use when determining project funding.

Bonus Points

The TAC has the option to assign bonus points to projects. Bonus point assignment is intended to provide flexibility for special situations and to provide better documentation and transparency for the normal give-and-take inherent to any process involving subjective scoring.

The assignment of bonus points is subject to specific criteria:

- The project must have some prominent characteristic which is not adequately covered by the selection criteria. A project whose purpose is to correct an unintended consequence or fine-tune the performance of a previously constructed project would also qualify for this criterion.
- The characteristic must have a regional benefit.
- The reasoning for the assignment of bonus points must be discussed openly and must be documented.
- The TAC did not recommend adding any bonus points at their meeting on May 1, 2024.

On May 1, 2024, TAC recommended approval of the 2023 Project Call Final Scores & Project Rankings, contingent on the following changes:

- All projects listed are assigned a project ranking.
- Any project that is eligible for Category 2 and Category 7 funding should be listed in both categories' scoring list.

Background

The Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) is the 25-year document that outlines the state of current transportation, projects future needs, and offers projects and other methods for keeping the people and freight in the KTMPO region moving efficiently. The MTP encompasses all aspects of transportation planning as well as transportation projects within the KTMPO region. Each local entity submits projects within their jurisdiction for possible inclusion into the MTP, and the Transportation Planning Policy Board (TPPB) prioritizes these projects based on the needs of the region. This plan is required to be updated every five years.

Chapter Updates

During review of the existing 2045 MTP staff determined that some chapters are extremely out of date and needed to be fully rewritten while other chapters would be okay with only updated information. Chapter 2 (Long Range Transportation Planning) and Chapter 5 (Transit) are two of the chapters that staff have rewritten with the help of HCTD staff for the transit chapter. Since these chapters underwent significant change staff wanted to provide the TAC an opportunity to review and provide feedback prior to the official public comment period. These chapters are included with the meeting materials for the TAC's review.

There is no more of a discernible safety concern at the requested speed than there would be in any other one way three lane interstate or most FM and RM roads within the county and state. Turn FM 2484 into a 3 or 4 lane road from the Stillhouse Road turnoff heading east into Salado. If not, at a minimum repair the damage caused by 18 wheelers that creates lane changing potholes and bumps and/or restrict 18 wheeler, specifically rock haulers, from traveling this road. Review and adjust the road pathway, specifically the curvature on approach, of the intersection of Knights Way and Mountain Lion Road in Harker Heights. The positioning of the traffic lights makes the intersection appear closer upon approach although travelers still have to navigate the curve of the road. Imagine running a race where the finish line is straight ahead, however to get from point A to the finish line you have to run a "J" pattern. That is what occurs here. In the current configuration, this creates a safety hazard of red light runners and lack of visibility to pedestrians and other travelers. Area wide mandate of all cross walk intersections to comply to a countdown plus X seconds before light change. Using Harker Heights as an example, the pedestrian cross walk will count down when it hits zero, the light goes to a fast yellow and red. A 2-3 second delay here would allow for pedestrians to clear the roadway and not be a countdown for motorists to floor it to get to and through the intersection. 
